





Tories Consolidate Lead Canadians Now Want and Expect Tory Victory

Methodology

WARNING: we do not consider a single night of tracking to be scientifically conclusive. These nightly releases are intended only to respond to curiosity about day-to-day movements. Their true statistical significance will become clearer when analysed as part of a larger weekly sample.

- The objectives of the Toronto Star/La Presse/EKOS Federal Election 2005-06 nightly polling are two-fold:
 - i. first, to create a large, reliable weekly sample, modeling voter intention and the driving factors, including the day-to-day trends (reported on Saturdays); and
 - ii. second, to provide the most immediate and focused summary of national voting intentions (reported on a daily basis).
- This document presents the daily findings from telephone surveys with a national random sample of Canadians, 18 years of age and older conducted between January 10-12, 2006.
 - Daily sample sizes and associated margins of error are presented on the next page.
 - Please note that the margin of error increases when the results are sub-divided.
 - Refusal rate and measurement errors will also increase the overall survey error.



Comparing federal vote intentions pre- and post-debates


Q: If a federal election were held tomorrow, which party would you vote for?

Q: If a federal election were held tomorrow, which party would you vote for?




Q: Did you watch or listen to any of the national Leaders' debates on television?





Winner of the debates


Q: Who do you think won the debates?





Loser of the debates


Q: Who do you think lost the debates?

Tracking likely winner over the campaign


Q: Putting aside your personal voting intentions for the next federal election, which party do you think will win?
