



The week in review: January 16-19, 2006



FEDERAL ELECTION 2005-06

Methodology

- The objectives of the Toronto Star/La Presse/EKOS Federal Election 2005-06 nightly polling are two-fold:
 - i. first, to create a large, reliable weekly sample, modeling voter intention and the driving factors, including the day-to-day trends (reported on Saturdays); and
 - ii. second, to provide the most immediate and focused summary of national voting intentions (reported on a daily basis).
- This document presents the daily findings from telephone surveys with a national random sample of Canadians, 18 years of age and older conducted between January 16-19, 2006.
 - Daily sample sizes and associated margins of error are presented on the next page.
 - Please note that the margin of error increases when the results are sub-divided.
 - Refusal rate and measurement errors will also increase the overall survey error.




Q: Which political party do you intend to vote for in the January 23 election?



Undecided/declined: 14.9%


Would not vote: 2.4%

Trend in federal vote intentions over the campaign: '06 vs. '04




Nightly tracking of federal vote intentions: Jan. 16-19

Q: Which political party do you intend to vote for in the January 23 election?




Base: Decided voters only (includes "leaners")



Federal voting intentions: gender and age




Vote intention among younger Canadians (<25)






Support for the conservatives increases with voter age




Federal voting intentions: education and income




Vote intention in the key regions


Federal vote intentions in Quebec over the campaign: '06 vs. '04



Federal voting intentions: Quebec




Federal vote intentions in ONTARIO over the campaign: '06 vs. '04




Federal voting intentions: Ontario



Federal vote intentions in B.C. over the campaign: '06 vs. '04





Tracking likely winner over the campaign


Q: Putting aside your personal voting intentions for the next federal election, which party do you think will win?

Preferred outcome of the election


Q: Which of the following outcomes do you think would be BEST?



Base: All Canadians; most recent data point Jan. 16-19, n=2481


Most Canadians would not change vote if they thought CPC would win
