Summary of a Survey Conducted for World Wildlife Fund Canada


July 25, 2005

Methodology

- Telephone survey of a random sample of 1,020 adult Canadians
- Surveying took place between July 6 and 12, 2005
- Results are valid to within +/-3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20
- All the data were statistically weighted to ensure the sample's regional, gender and age composition reflects that of the actual population of Canada according to Census data.

Have you heard anything about recent plans by the United States government to approve oil drilling in the Alaska Wildlife Refuge?





Background/Preamble

The Alaska Wildlife Refuge is a 19 million acre ecologically sensitive area that was set aside for protection in 1960. Supporters of the drilling say it will lessen US dependence on foreign oil and have a minor impact on the environment. Opponents say the amount of oil produced would have little impact on foreign dependence, create extensive damage to the environment, and that the focus for Americans should be on conservation rather than more oil production.

Familiarity with the Issue



Support for/Opposition to US Plans to Approve Drilling


