Methodology

- The objectives of the Toronto Star/La Presse/EKOS Federal Election 2005-06 nightly polling are two-fold:
 - i. first, to create a large, reliable weekly sample, modeling voter intention and the driving factors, including the day-to-day trends (reported on Saturdays); and
 - second, to provide the most immediate and focused summary of national voting intentions (reported on a daily basis).
- This document presents findings from telephone surveys conducted with a national random sample of Canadians, 18 years of age and older on January 3 and 4, 2006.
 - The sample distribution and associated margins of error are presented on the next page.
 - Please note that the margin of error increases when the results are sub-divided.
 Refusal rate and measurement errors will also increase the overall survey error.


