# Key terms (i)

## » **Populism:**

- Corrupt elite
- Power restored to people
- Strategy for gaining power

## » **Ordered (Authoritarian) outlook:**

- Emphasizes obedience, order, hostility to outgroups
- Triggered under certain conditions
- Search for strong man, turn back the clock, pull up the drawbridge

# Key terms (ii)

- » **Ordered-open axis:**
  - Shift from right-left
- » Renewed interest in authoritarian outlook

# Conditions underlying authoritarian outlook

- » Conditions underlying the resurgence of authoritarian outlook:
  - Wage stagnation/Middle class decline
  - Hyper-concentration of wealth
  - Cultural backlash/Normative threat
  - External risk

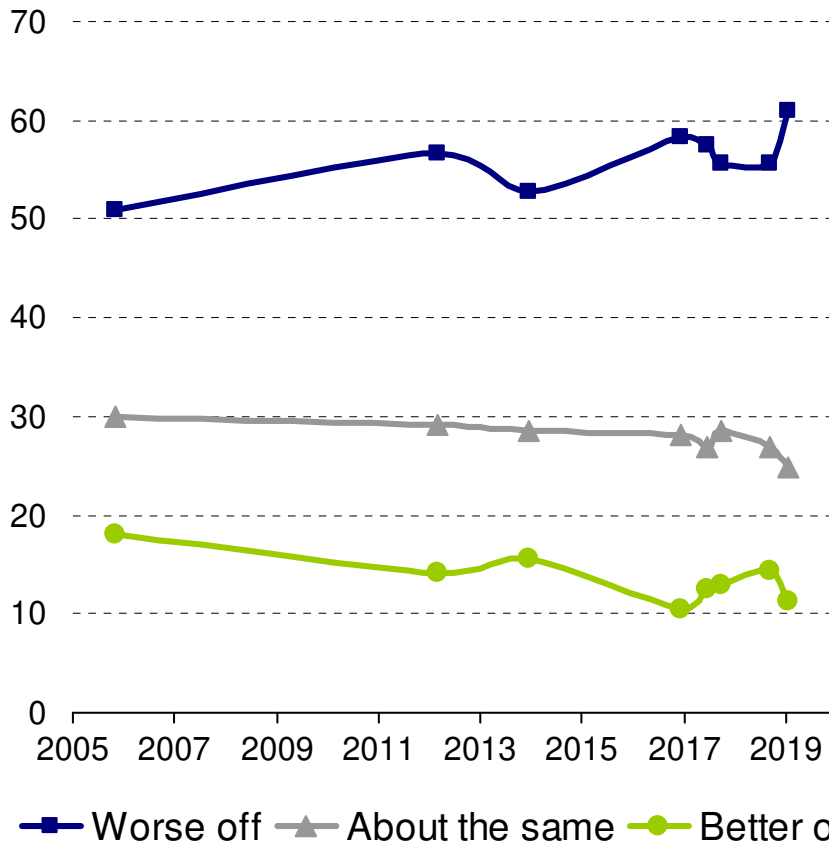

# Generational outlook & social class

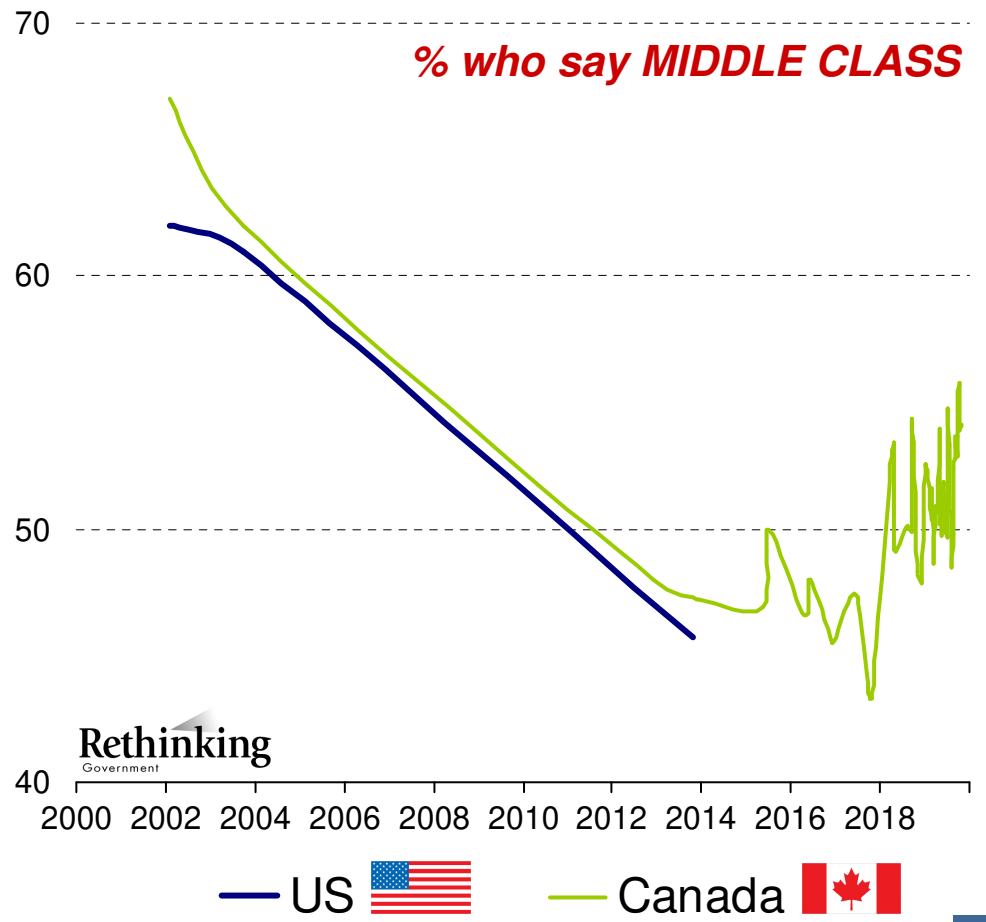
## Generational Outlook

“Would you describe you and your household as poor, working class, middle class, or upper class?”

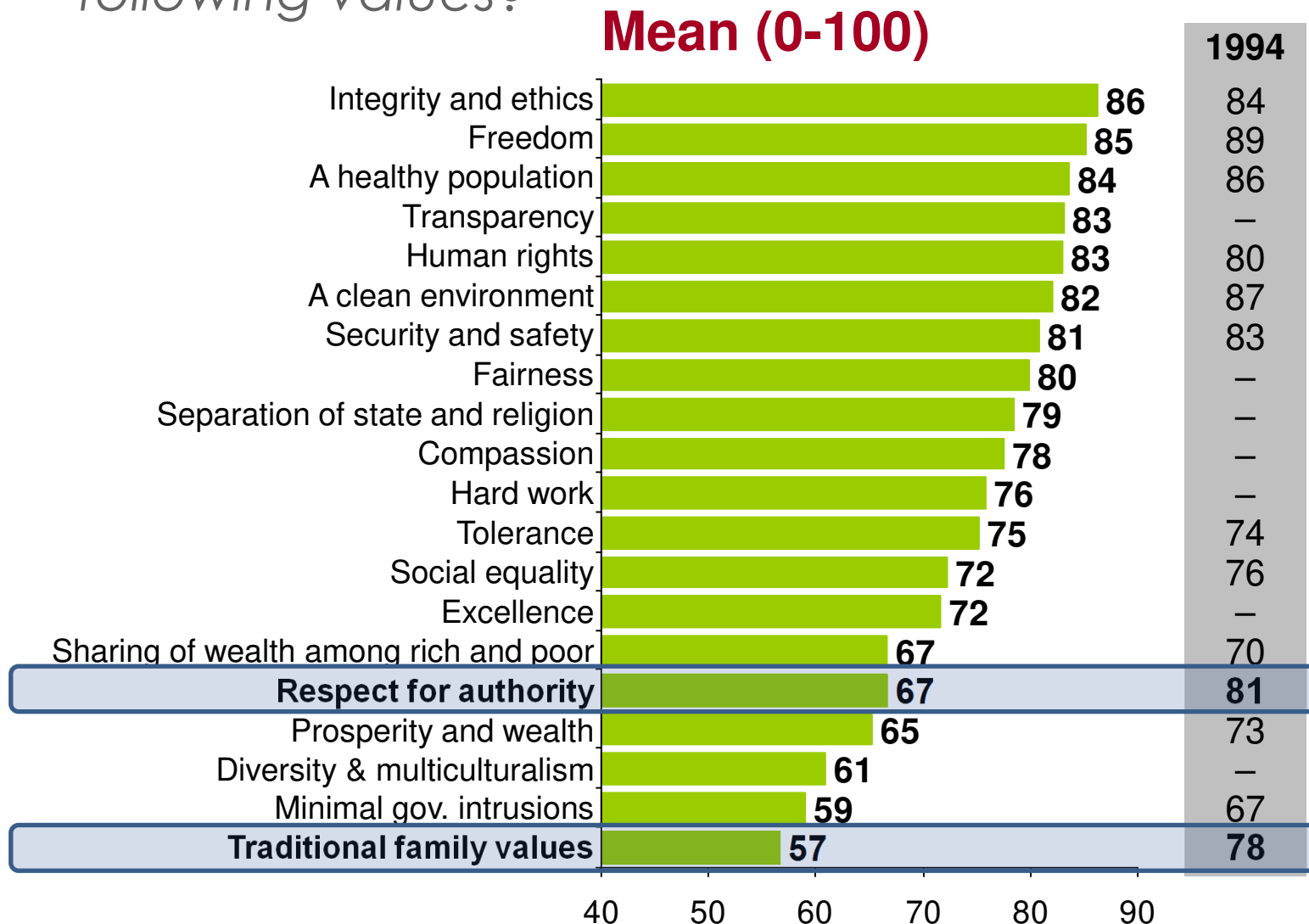


**BASE (left):** Canadians; January 10-15, 2019, n=978, MOE +/- 3.1%, 19 times out of 20

**Q.** How would you rate the importance of each of the following values?

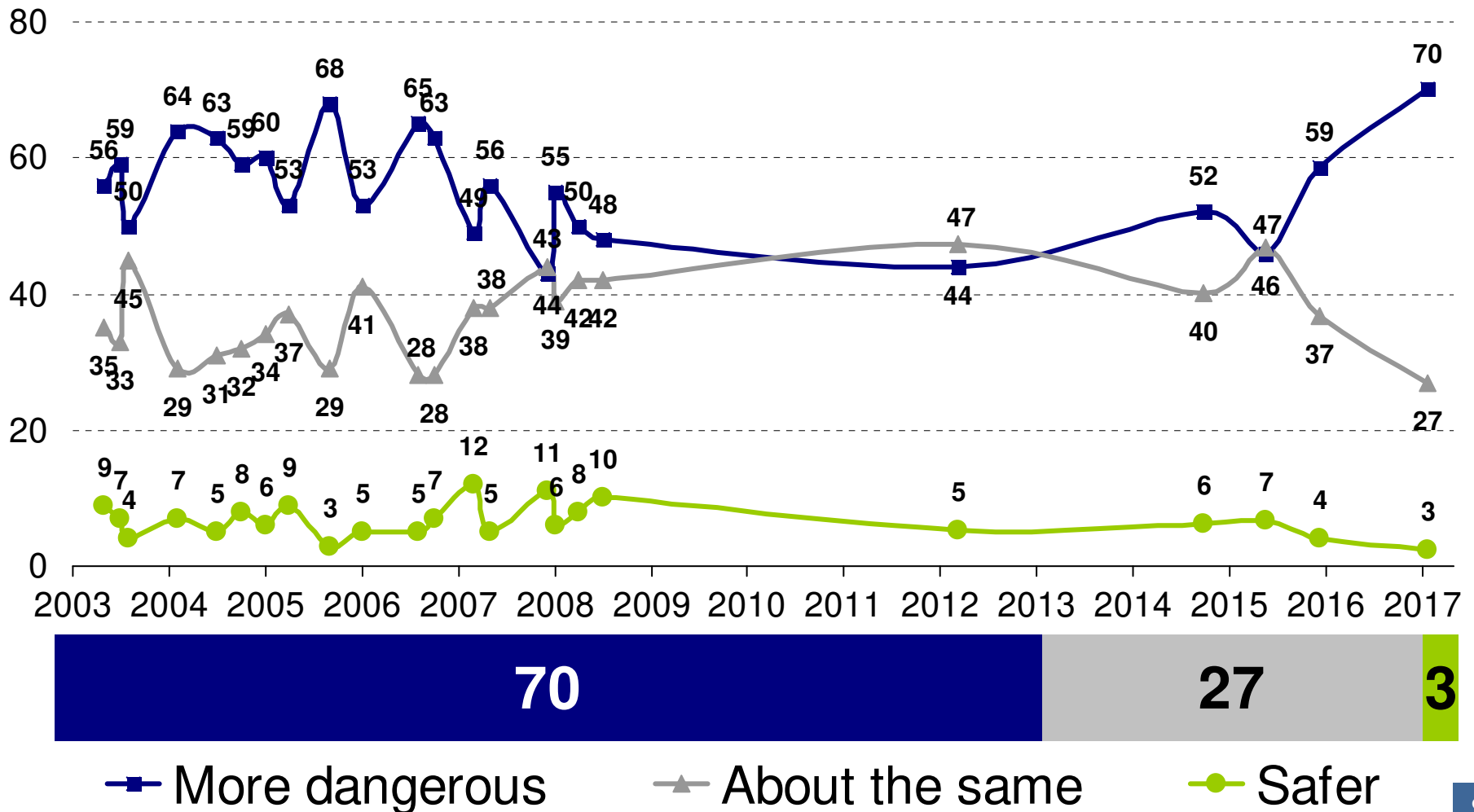

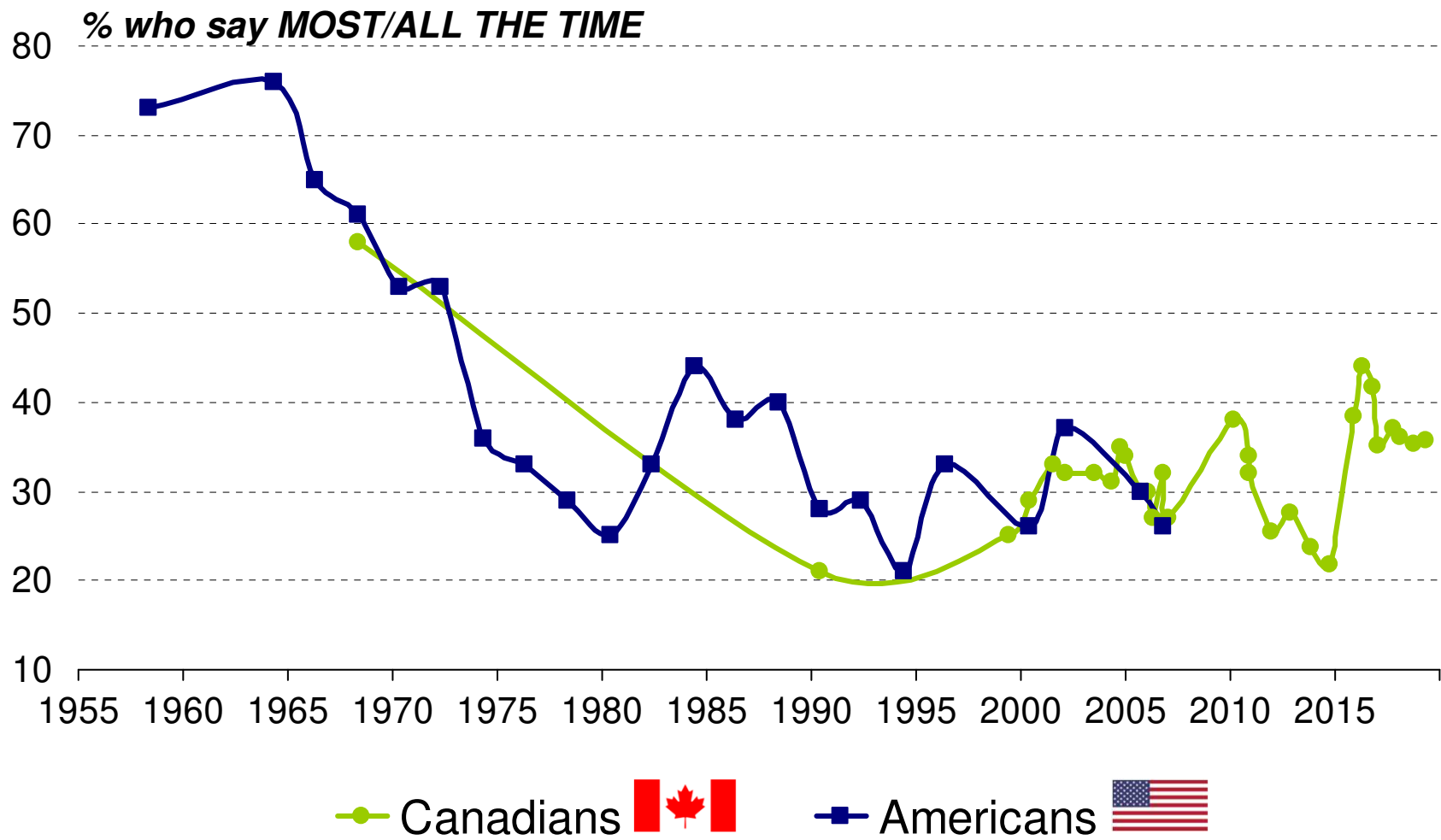
# Perceived danger in the world

*Note: Figures adjusted to exclude those who skipped the question.*

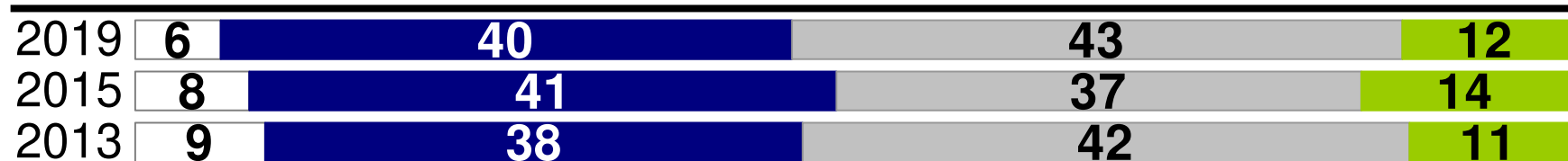

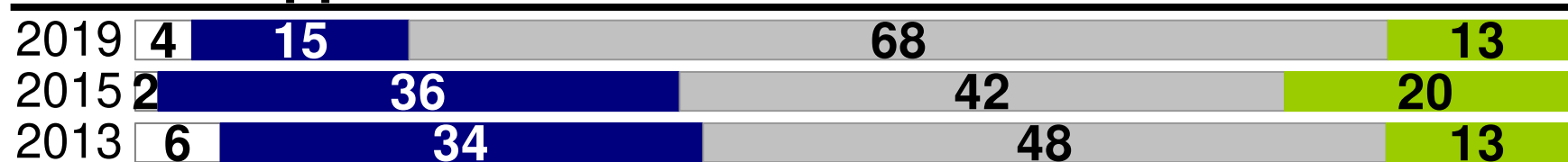
# Attitudes to minorities by party support

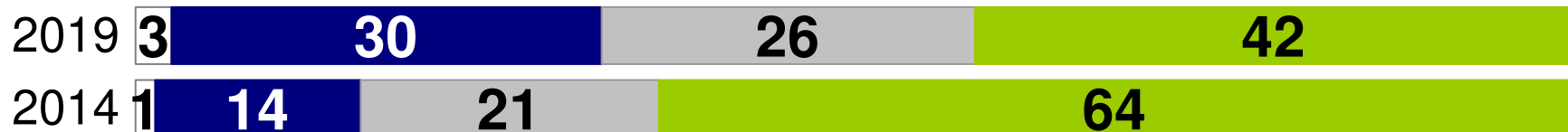

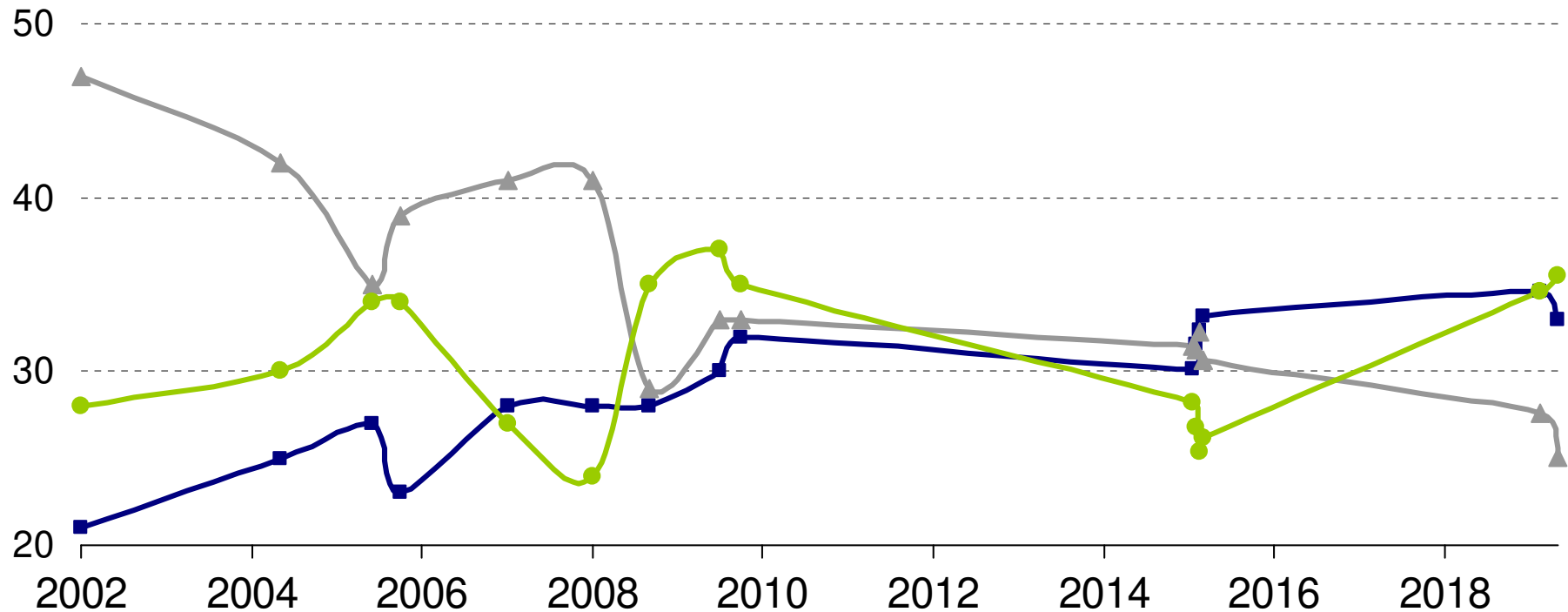

# Political ideology

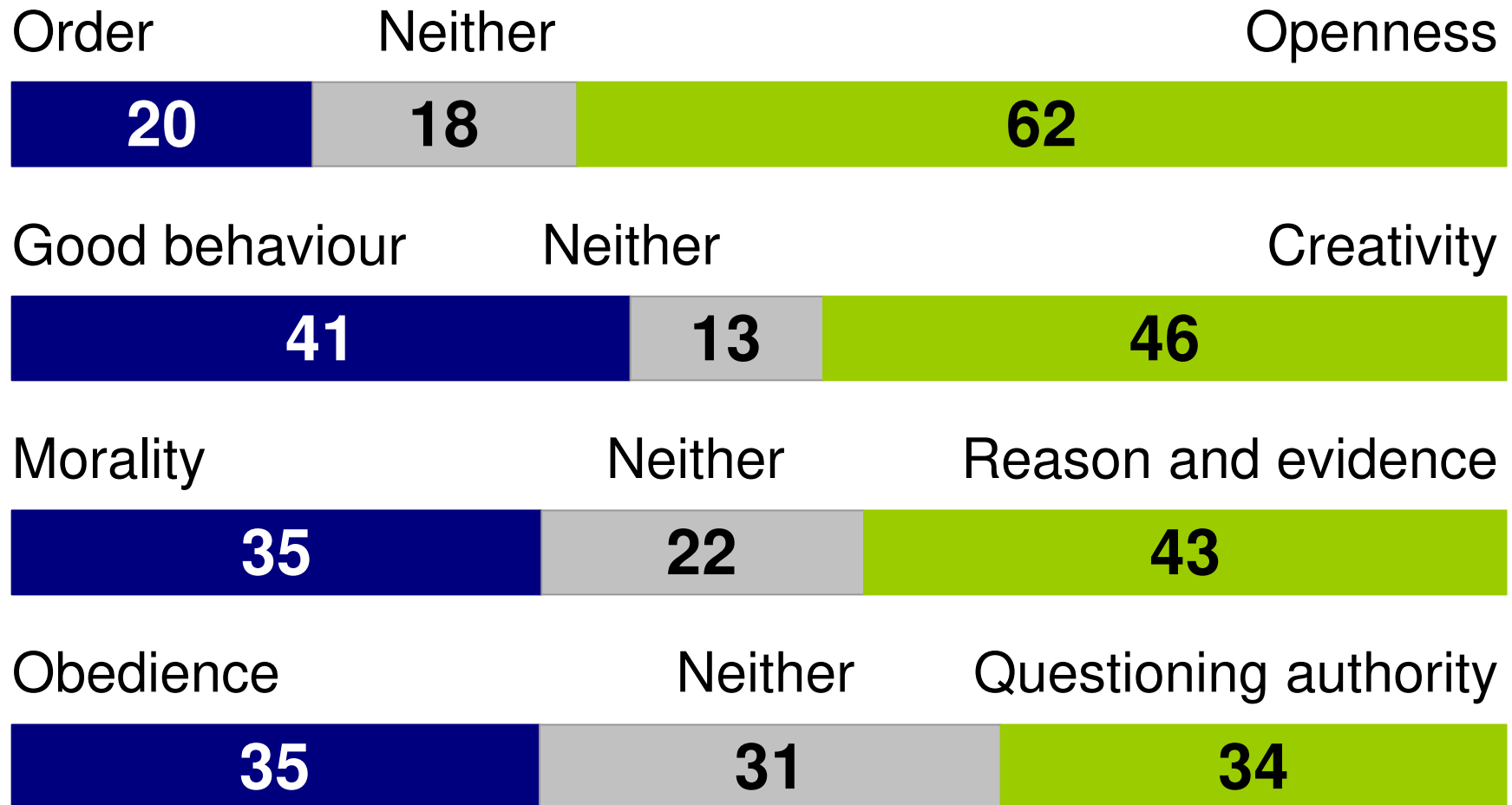
**Q.** Forgetting about your current party choice, do you consider yourself a small "l" liberal or a small "c" conservative?

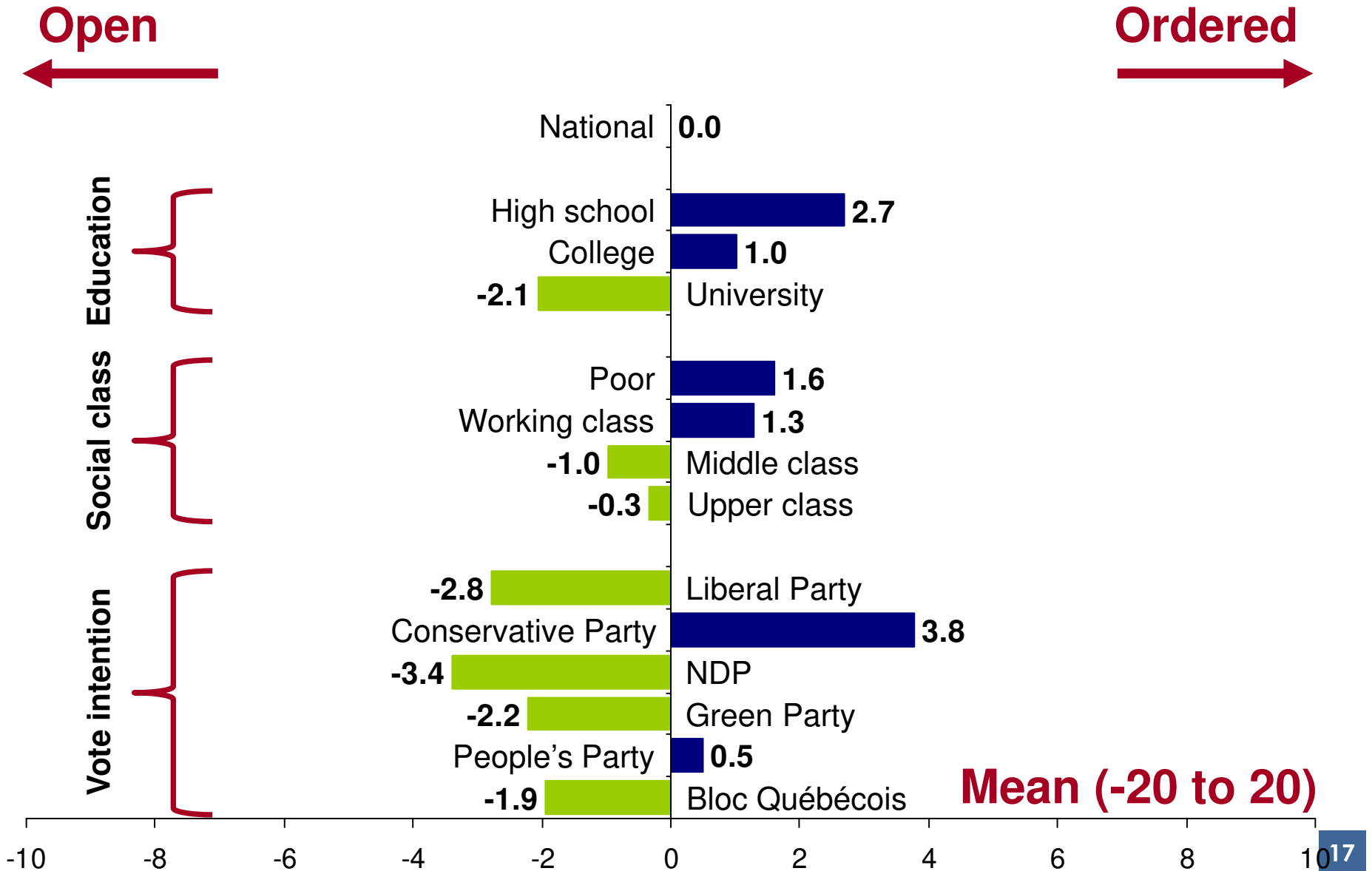
**Q.** *When raising children, which of the following do you think is more important to emphasize?*

# Most important issue by party support

**BASE:** Canadians; January 21-27, 2015 (n=1,909), MOE +/- 2.2%, 19 times out of 20

# Overview of 2019 federal election

- » Demographics 2019 very different than 2015
  - Conservative base focussed in non-university, men, and working class
- » Dramatic and growing polarization on key issues:
  - Climate change
  - Science
  - Visible minority immigration
  - Trust in media
  - Overall direction of country
  - Identity politics

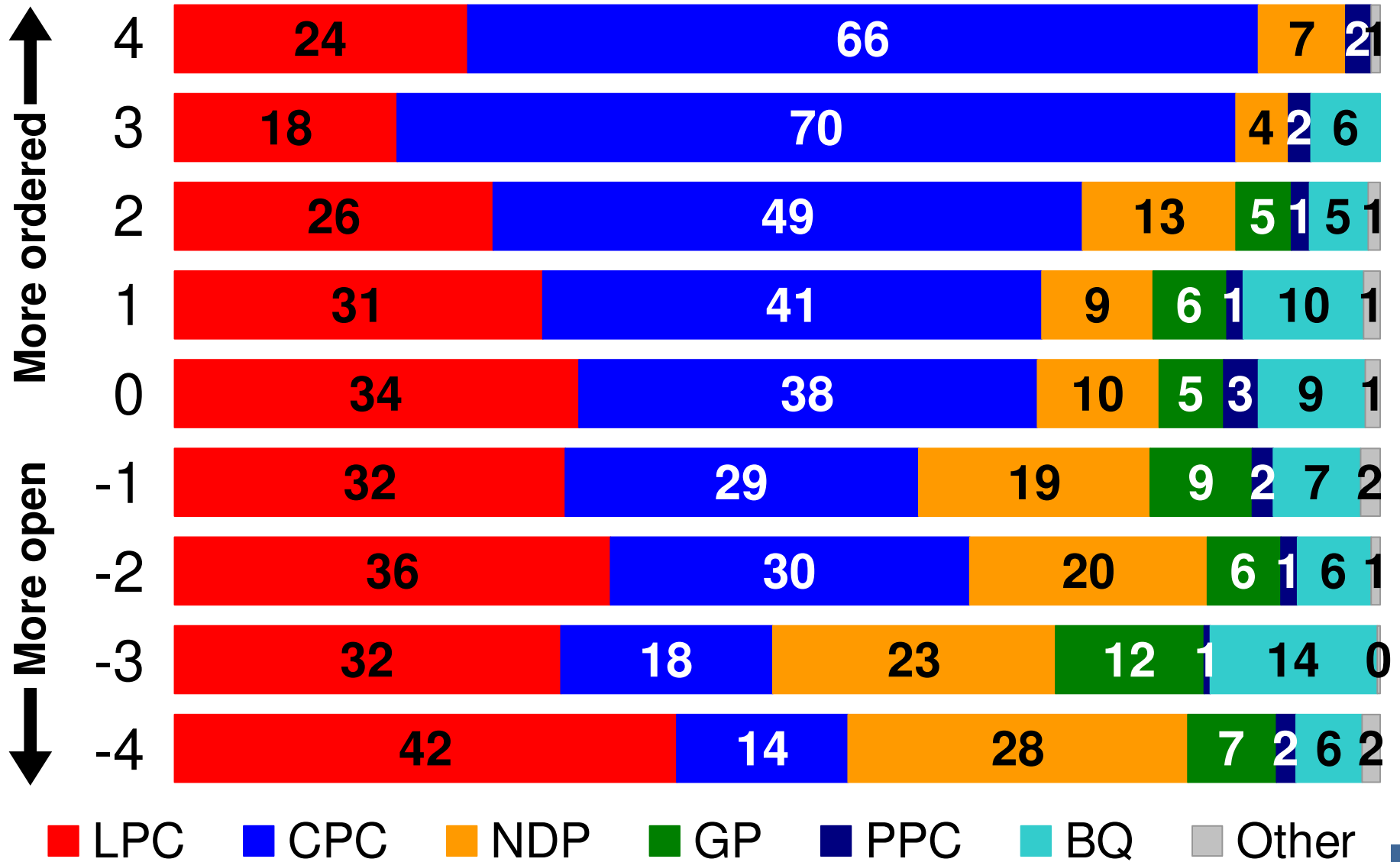
# Impact of ordered populism (i)

- » Ordered – or authoritarian – populism critical/poorly understood force
- » Open-ordered index strongest predictor of Conservative vote
- » Also predicts who switched from conservative to progressive and vice versa
  - Some 2015 Liberals who are ordered went Conservative
  - Some 2015 Liberals who are more open went NDP

## Impact of ordered populism (ii)

- Less ordered Conservatives went Liberal and NDP
- More ordered Conservatives stayed Conservative
- » Tensions in Alberta & Saskatchewan not just 'western alienation', but also expression of ordered outlook?
- » May be at the heart of heightened polarization we see in Canada
  - Mimics patterns evident in the United States and elsewhere

# Conclusions

- » Deep dissatisfaction with 2019 election
- » Country bitterly divided on East-West, social class, and gender
- » Deep polarization existential threat to consensus and sound public interest
  - Mimics same patterns and trajectories in the U.S. and U.K.
- » Urgent need to improve depth of understanding of this phenomenon in Canada
