Results of EKOS/CBC News Survey

January 19, 2009



Methodology

This survey was conducted January 15-17, 2009 using EKOS' unique hybrid internet-telephone research panel, Probit. This panel is randomly recruited from the general population, meaning that, the only way to be included in Probit is through random selection. Unlike opt-in internet-only research panels, Probit supports confidence intervals and error testing.

- In total, a random sample of 1,000 Canadians aged 18 and over responded to the survey.
- A sample of this size provides a margin of error of +/- 3.1 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error increases when the results are sub-divided (i.e., error margins for sub-groups such as regions).
- All the data were statistically weighted to ensure the samples composition reflects that
 of the actual population of Canada according to Census data.



Highlights

- Canadians express an unbridled personal approval of Barack Obama, but a more qualified approach to policy positions (Afghanistan, NAFTA and Deficits)
- Positives strengthen interest in a "common" or shared approach with the U.S. (particularly the economy, climate change and borders)
- Stephen Harper applauded for pursuing a "common approach", but overall Democratic/Obama shift modestly favours Michael Ignatieff and LPC fortunes
- Approval comparisons (both personal and policy preparation) leave Harper looking less attractive




Canadian Assessment of the President-Elect



Job approval rating for President-Elect Obama


Q. Next week, Barack Obama will be sworn in as President of the United States. Do you approve or disapprove of the way Barak Obama is handling his job as President-Elect?





Importance of "charisma and style" to Obama's success





Impact of Obama Administration on Canada-U.S. relations


Q. Once Barack Obama takes office, do you think Canada's relationship with the United States will be ...

Q. [If expectation is for a "fundamentally different" relationship] Is this a good thing or a bad thing, or neither good nor bad?



Can Canadian and American administrations' work together?


Q. Do you think that having governments with different political leanings will make it easier or harder for the Canada and the U.S. to work together, or will it make no difference?

Q. Do you think that the Democratic dominance in the U.S. makes it more or less likely that a Liberal government will be elected in Canada in the next election?






Shared Priorities: The Economy, Climate Change, and Trade



Economy the "top common priority" for Canada & the U.S.



Support for a common approach on climate change


Q. As you may be aware, Stephen Harper's government has said it would like to develop a common approach on the issue of climate change with the Obama administration. Do you support this approach for Canada?

Q. From what you have heard, how sound would you say [the Conservative government in Canada's/Barack Obama's] plans are to combat the current recession?








Concern with deficit spending








Personal impact of Canadian vs. American economic policies


Q. Whose economic policies to combat the recession do you think will have the greater effect on your economic well-being and that of your family?





Concern over potential new trade arrangements


