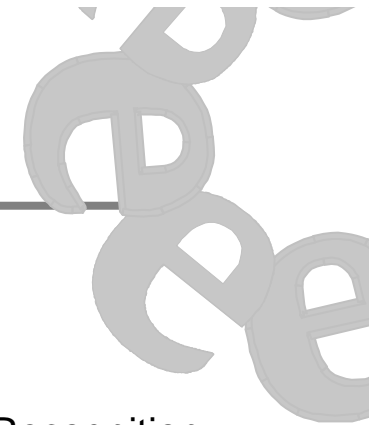


# Results of a CBC News Survey

December 4, 2008





# Methodology

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This survey was conducted December 2 and 3, 2008 using Interactive Voice Recognition (IVR) technology, which allows respondents to enter their preferences by punching the keypad on their phone, rather than telling them to an operator.

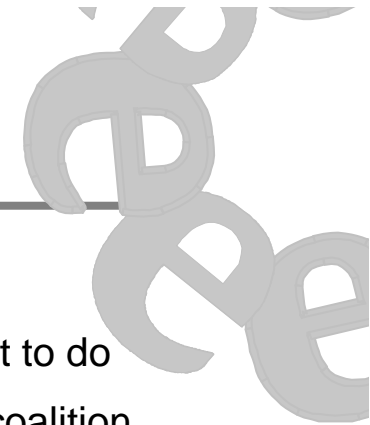
- In total, a random sample of 2536 Canadians aged 18 and over responded to the survey.
- A sample of this size provides a margin of error of +/- 1.9 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. The margin of error increases when the results are sub-divided (i.e., error margins for sub-groups such as regions).
- All the data were statistically weighted to ensure the samples composition reflects that of the actual population of Canada according to Census data.

The survey was conducted by EKOS Research Associates on behalf of the CBC.

## Overview of Results

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### *Preferred solution to current political impasse*

- The Canadian public are divided; there is very little consensus about what to do
  - A plurality favour taking a break, but sizable minority also supports coalition
  - One area of consensus = little appetite for yet another election (unsurprising given very low satisfaction with recent election)
- Mixed confidence in Governor General which leans mildly positive
- Stephen Harper and the Conservatives enjoy advantage over Stéphane Dion-led coalition when it comes to the economy

### *Vote intention*

- Conservative support up 7 points since the election, basically at expense of LPC/NDP
- Extremely large divisions emerging in public
  - Region: East – West fracture now starts at the Ottawa River (CPC have an astonishing 22-point in Ontario); Alberta incensed
  - Party Lines: predictable, but Governor General is much more trusted among LPC and NDP voters

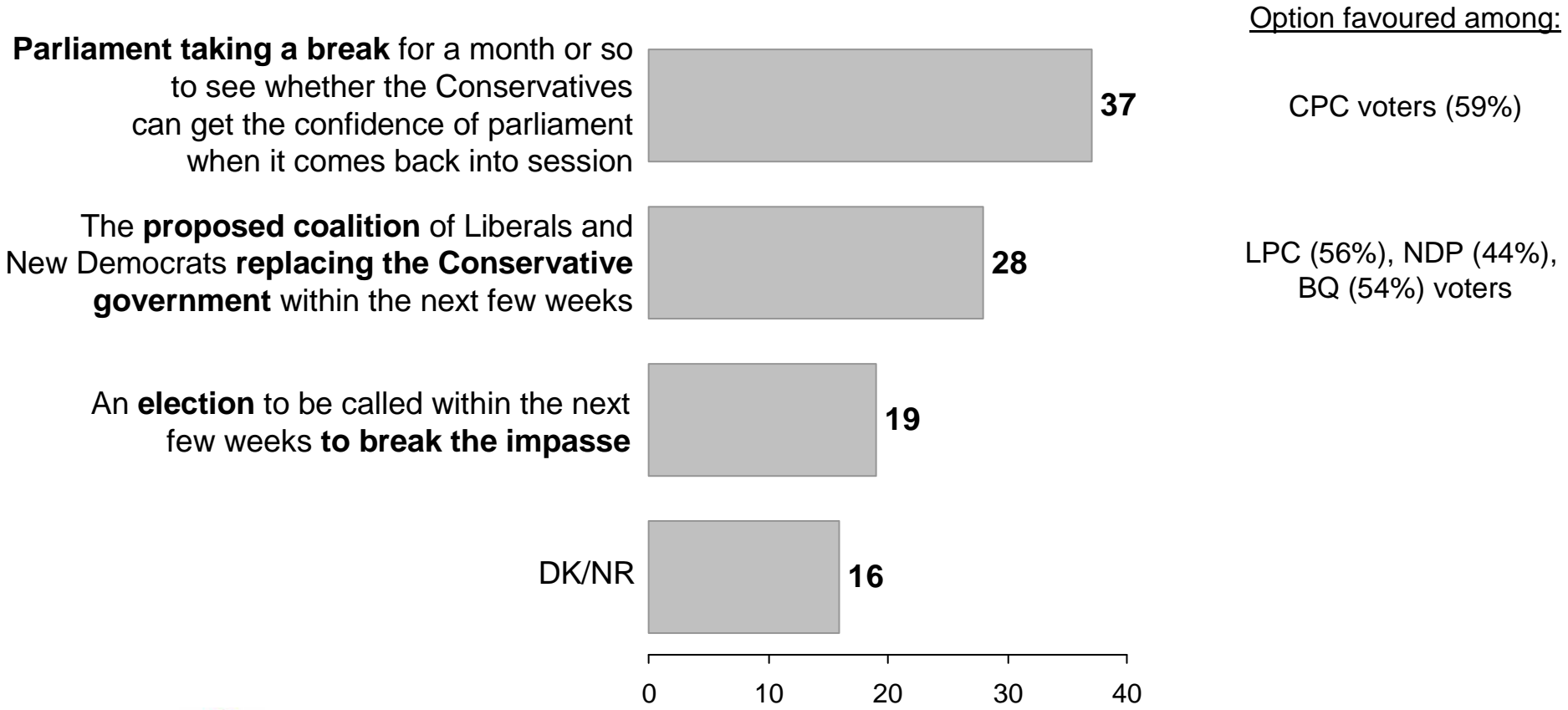

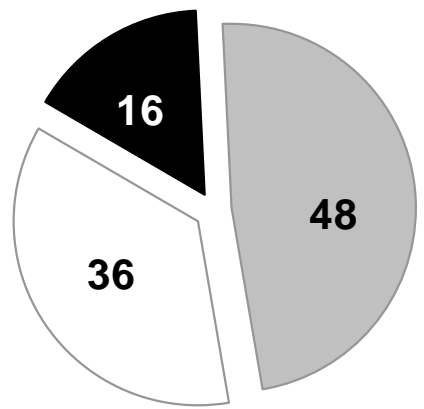

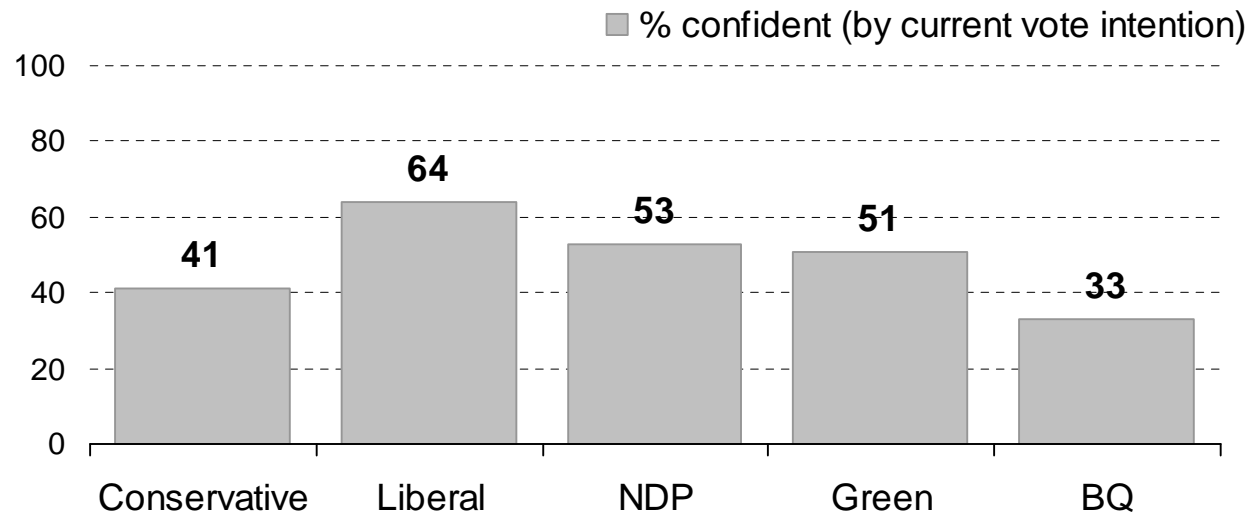


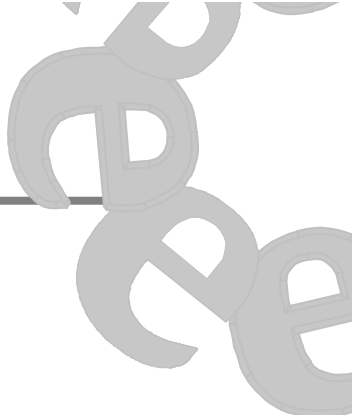
# Confidence in Governor General

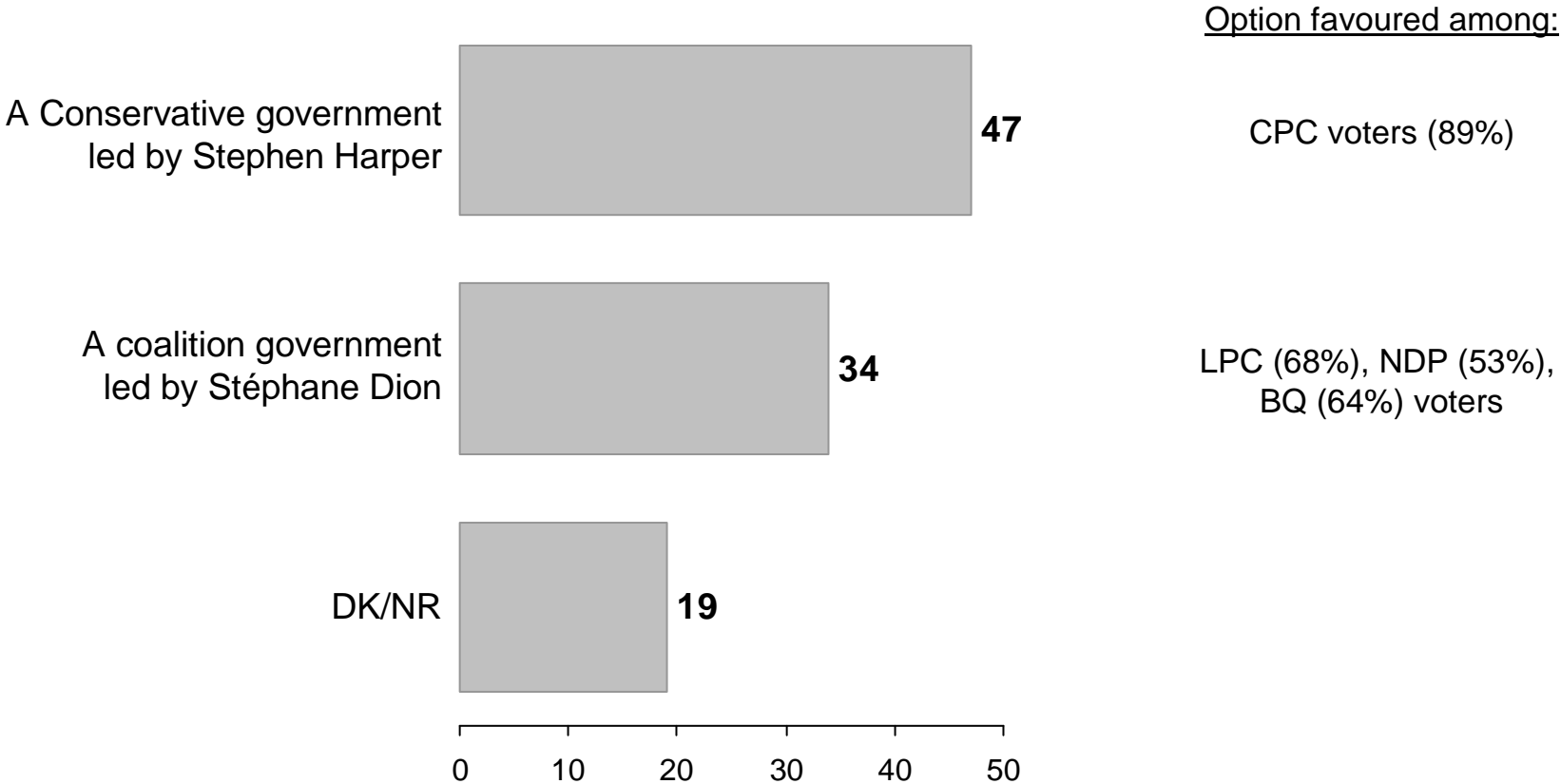
□ Not very confident

Q. In your opinion, who would be better able to deal with the current economic crisis?

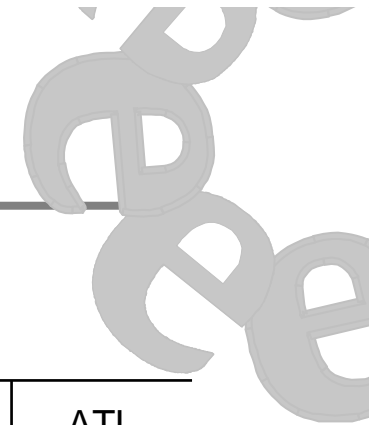

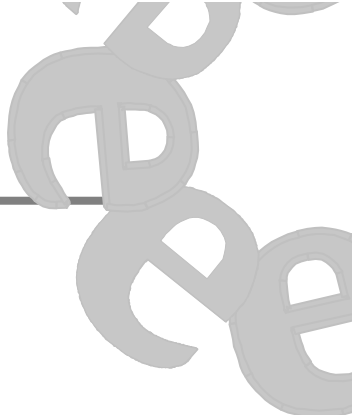




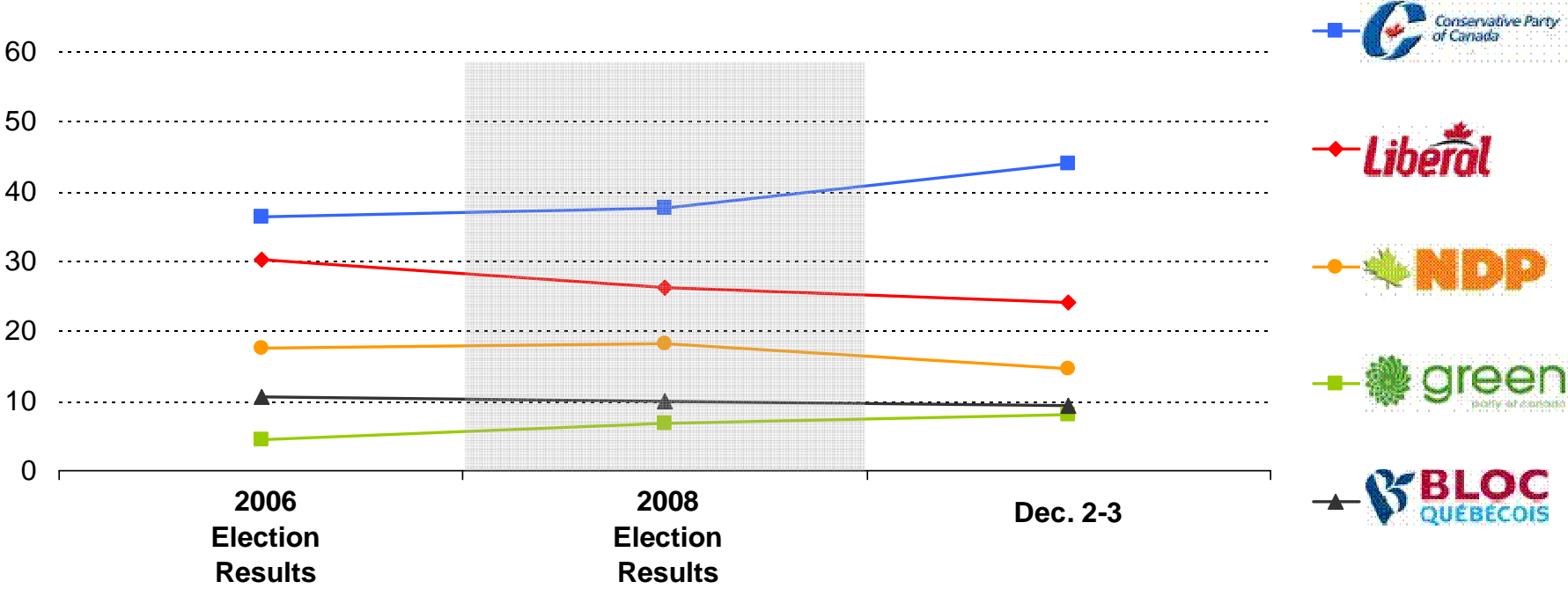

# Conclusions





## Conclusions

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- The Conservatives are winning the initial public opinion war.
- There seems, however, to be a modest night-to-night trend that favours the coalition on all measures (i.e., vote intention, three-partner coalition).
- While too early to say, it may be that the public are digging into deep and irreconcilable differences on this issue.
- What started as a political skirmish over the economy now has the potential to produce deep wounds to national unity.
- Bottom Line: Despite initial favourable response to the Conservatives, the public are flummoxed and angry. Dispute seems to be aggravating existing national fault lines.

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
